The app allows users to take photos of offensive tags, geo-locate them



and send a message to the <u>local authorities</u> responsible for removing them via the group Licra, the International League against <u>Racism</u> and Anti-Semitism.

"You can't fight racism and anti-Semitism in the 21st century as we did in the past," Licra president Alain Jakubowicz said as the app became available for download.
